**Rules**

1. All adult exhibitors must be members of WHAGA. Competition open to members of the Association and families unless otherwise stated.
2. All horticultural exhibits must have been grown in the garden or allotment of the exhibitor. Pot plants must have been the property of the exhibitor for more than two months.
3. Entries will be accepted with the correct entrance fee, up to Thursday evening 12th September in the trading hut. Entries may also be posted through No.30 Fernbrook Drive's letter box. Please ensure correct money (cash only) is enclosed with name and address and telephone number written on the envelope in case of any query. No entries accepted after Thursday 12th September.
4. Where applicable the Show will be governed by RHS and NVS Rules.
5. Two or more persons may not exhibit in the same class separately from the same garden or allotment.
6. No exhibitor to be allowed more than one entry in a class, except for Any Other Vegetable or Fruit in which any number of different kinds of vegetables/fruits may be entered.
7. Preserves must be shown in 340g-454g jars (approx). All entries must have been made within last 12 months and dated. Jams and Jellies should be covered with a twist or push-on top. Pickles and chutneys should be covered with a vinegar proof solid top. Labels must be small, white and plain on jar or bottle stating contents or type.
8. Hall to be cleared at 12 noon for judging. Only judges and officials allowed in the hall whilst judging is in progress.
9. Exhibits must not be removed until after presentations.
10. **Only Association vases to be used unless specified.**
11. Prize money must be collected before 4.30pm on day of Show.
12. Objections to be made in writing to the Chair within one hour of the show opening to the public. Committee decisions are final.
13. All winners cups and bowls are held by the Society in perpetuity and held by successful exhibitors for one year only. These should be returned to the Secretary two weeks before the show of the following year.

- Small - Usually between 100mm and 150mm diameter but NOT exceeding 170mm diameter
- Miniature - Usually between 50mm and 100mm diameter but NOT exceeding 115mm diameter
- Small ball - Usually between 100mm and 150mm diameter but NOT exceeding 170mm diameter
- Miniature Ball - Usually between 50mm and 100mm diameter but NOT exceeding 115mm diameter
- Pompon - NOT exceeding 52mm diameter
- Waterlily/Colerette - Usually between 115mm and 170mm diameter

- 61 Tomatoes: 5 plum type over 35 mm
- 62 Tomatoes: 5 tomatoes – other than plum or beefsteak
- 63 Tomatoes: 3 “Beefsteak” type
- 64 Tomatoes: 9 small fruited under 35mm
- 65 Tomatoes: 1 truss, predominately ripe
- 66 Tomatoes: 5 any colour except red
- 67 Shallots: 9 of one cultivar over 30mm diameter
- 68 Shallots: small, 9 of 1 cultivar, not over 30mm diameter
- 69 Onions: 3 dressed, over 225g

- \*71\* Collection** of Onions: 3 of each, under 225mm, over 225mm and 3 shallotts
- 72 Marrows: 2 of 1 cultivar 200mm-380mm in length

- 76 Cabbage: 2 of 1 cultivar 75mm of stalk

- 79 Herbs: 1 container not less than 50mm across of cut culinary herbs (List available in Hut)
